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Taps – the real story

A while back I included an article on Taps. Recently, I found out the story I included was an "urban legend". I found the "real" origin and thought I'd include it. - Dale

It's hard to feel surprised when a melody as hauntingly beautiful as Taps picks up a legend about how it came to be written -- it's too mournfully direct a piece for the mere truth to suffice.

Taps was composed in July 1862 at Harrison's Landing in Virginia, but after that the fanciful e-mail quoted above parts way with reality. There was no dead son, Confederate or otherwise; no lone bugler sounding out the dead boy's last composition. How the call came into being was never anything more than one influential soldier deciding his unit could use a bugle call for particular occasions and setting about to come up with one.

If anyone can be said to have composed 'Taps,' it was Brig. Gen. Daniel Butterfield, Commander of the 3rd Brigade, 1st Division, V Army Corps, Army of the Potomac, during the American Civil War. Dissatisfied with the customary firing of three rifle volleys at the conclusion of

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burials during battle and also needing a method of ceremonially imparting meaning to the end of a soldier's day, he likely altered an older piece known as "Tattoo," a French bugle call used to signal "lights out," into the call we now know as 'Taps.' (Alternatively, he wrote the whole thing from scratch, a possibility not at all supported by his lack of musical background and ability.)

Whether he wrote it straight from the cuff or improvised something new by rearranging an older work, Butterfield brought 'Taps' into being. With the help of his bugler, Oliver W. Norton of Chicago, the concept was transformed into its present form. "Taps" was quickly taken up by both sides of the conflict, and within months was being sounded by buglers in both Union and Confederate forces.

Then as now, 'Taps' serves as a vital component in ceremonies honoring military dead. It is also understood by American servicemen as an end-of-day 'lights out' signal.

When "Taps" is played at a military funeral, it is customary to salute if in uniform, or place your hand over your heart if not.

"THE ROAD TO FAITH" Rev Donna L Warren, Chaplain

In the ordinary areas of life, most of us betray a certain amount of cynicism, pessimism, and doubt. It is easy for us to question the certainty of things because it is so difficult for us be absolutely certain of much in life. This can be true in the very sensitive area of human relationships, as well as the basic area of our faith in God. Thomas, one of the Apostles, gives a classic example of this kind of uncertainty of doubt, about the most fundamental fact of our faith in Jesus God. his resurrection from the dead.

Thomas is often referred to as a "twin", in this respect he can

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easily be identified as our twin. We can resonate so much with his reaction to the other Apostles' stories about the risen Christ, because we, too, are a mixture if fear and doubt, of cynicism and trust, of belief and unbelief. Along with Thomas, most of us inevitably find along the road of faith certain stumbling blocks that at first seen to question or weaken our faith, but in the long run can be the very stuff which strengthen our faith.

A certain amount of cynicism or pessimism seems to be inevitable factor of human life as it is lived out in its various phases. We become particularly aware of this during an election season, for example, as we listen to the glorious promises of candidates for office. We voters tend to question the sincerity and reality of the promises. It also happens in the field of commerce and business as we read or see the glowing ads of what the products can do for us at amazingly low prices. It happens in the field of human relationships, especially in budding relationships of love, when heartfelt expressions of

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love and promises are exchanged between lovers. Even here we tend to show a certain element of cynicism. Remember the famous scene out of "My Fair Lady", when Eliza Doolittle sings that sprightly song, "Show Me!" in response to a young man's profession of great love for her?

Our faith is a lot like the sun. Sometimes it is gig and bright and clearly visible in the sky. At other times we can't even see it. It has disappeared behind a layer of clouds and seems to have vanished from the sky.

We know from experience, however, that the sun is always somewhere in the sky. It's just that we can't see it all the time. Faith is like that, it is always there no matter what we may feel or think.

As Jesus said, "Happy are those who have not seen, yet believe."

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Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

Interesting facts about the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and the Sentinels of the Third United States Infantry Regiment "Old Guard"

- 1. How many steps does the guard take during his walk across the tomb of the Unknowns and why?
- 21 steps. It alludes to the twentyone gun salute, which is the highest honor given any military or foreign dignitary.
- 2. How long does he hesitate after his about face to begin his return walk and why?
- 21 seconds, for the same reason as answer number 1.
- 3. Why are his gloves wet? His gloves are moistened to prevent his losing his grip on the rifle
- 4. Does he carry his rifle on the same shoulder all the time, and if not, why not?

No, he carries the rifle on the shoulder away from the tomb. After his march across the path, he executes an about face and moves the rifle to the outside shoulder.

5. How often are the guards changed?

Guards are changed every thirty minutes, twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year.

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6. What are the physical traits of the guard limited to?

For a person to apply for guard duty at the tomb, he must be between 5' 10" and 6' 2" tall and his waist size cannot exceed 30".

Other requirements of the Guard:

They must commit 2 years of life to guard the tomb. live in a barracks under the tomb, and cannot drink any alcohol on or off duty FOR THE REST OF THEIR LIVES. They cannot swear in public FOR THE REST OF THEIR LIVES and cannot disgrace the uniform {fighting} or the tomb in any way After TWO YEARS, the guard is given a wreath pin that is worn on their lapel signifying they served as guard of the tomb. There are only 400 presently worn. The guard must obey these rules for the rest of their lives or give up the wreath pin.

The shoes are specially made with very thick soles to keep the heat and cold from their feet. There are metal heel plates that extend to the top of the shoe in order to make the loud click as they come to a halt. There are no wrinkles, folds or lint on the uniform. Guards dress for duty in front of a full-length mirror.

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The first SIX MONTHS of duty a guard cannot talk to anyone. nor watch TV. All off duty time is spent studying the 175 notable people laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery. A guard must memorize who they are and where they are interred. Among the notables are: President Taft, Joe E. Lewis {the boxer} and Medal of Honor winner Audie Murphy, {the most decorated soldier of WWII} of Hollywood fame. Every guard spends FIVE HOURS A DAY getting his uniforms ready for guard duty.
