SOCIAL SECURITY TURNS

70

Social Security turns 70 this month. While both sides debate how to keep the program healthy, here are a few fascinating facts about it: □ A legal Secretary was the first person to collect monthly benefits. She paid \$24.75 in taxes to the program (1937-39) before retiring and got back more than \$22,000, living until 1975. □ The tax rate for Social Security (including the employer contribution) initially was 2%; it's now 12.4%. In 1937, only the first \$3000 of income was taxed; today, it's \$90,000. □ Last year 48 million Americans got Social Security. Until 2004, even felons on the run were allowed benefits by law. A 2001 audit showed that \$31 million had been paid to the dead, mostly because of poor record keeping.

□ The average monthly retirement benefit is \$955; 40% of Americans over 65 reportedly would be in poverty without Social Security. In general, to qualify, you must spend 10 years in the workforce and earn the minimum each year (now \$3680).

Don't Let Them Steal Your Car

Seems that car thieves have

found yet another way to steal your car or truck without any effort at all. The car thieves peer through the windshield, write down the VIN# from the label on the dash, go to the local car dealership and request a duplicate key based on the VIN#. I didn't believe this email, so I called a friend at Chrysler Dodge and pretended I had lost my keys. They told me just bring in the VIN#, and they would cut me one on the spot, and I could order the keyless device if I wanted. The Car Dealer's Parts Department will make a duplicate key from the VIN#, and collect payment from the thief who will return to your car. He doesn't have to break in, do any damage to the vehicle, or draw attention to himself. All he has to do is walk up to your car, insert the key, and off he goes to a local Chop Shop with your vehicle. You don't believe it? It IS that easy. To avoid this happening to you, simply put something over the VIN Metal Label located on the dash. By law, you can not remove the VIN#, but you can cover it so it can't be viewed by a thief.

CHERISH OUR CHILDREN

(This applies to all of us, whether or not we have been parents).

Parents, can you remember when your children were born and after cleaning up the little one, the doctor or nurse wrapped the infant in a blanket and handed it to you? Remember the joy, the awe, the tears as you received this gift of life crying for the first time in this world. Do you recall how fragile that life seemed, how delicate, how precious?

Now move ahead 12 or 14 months. You have cleaned up messes, been thrown up on, lost who knows how many hours of sleep, spent hours at the doctor's office frantic because of a fever that won't respond to normal treatment. On the downside, you would agree with the person who described a baby as a digestive apparatus with a loud noise at one end and no responsibility at the other. But on the positive side, you are humbled by this helpless little creation who needs you in every area.

Somewhere between infancy and the teen years, many of us lose that sense of awe, that sense of preciousness we felt when we first received our child in the delivery room. For many, the

child becomes a burden, a bother, a recipient of our anger and frustration at things the child in no way caused. If a divorce has occurred, the children may have even become pawns between the mother and father, or be treated as a piece of property to be exchanged every weekend.

In an era when 1.1 million teens become pregnant each year, when one out of four children face a risk of being sexually or physically abused by the time they reach 18, when 20% of those hospitalized for depression are under the age of 18, **IT IS TIME THAT WE LEARN ONCE AGAIN HOW TO CHERISH ALL CHILDREN WETHER THEY BELONG TO US OR SOMEONE ELSE.**

And there is no better model than our Lord Jesus Christ who held every child in high esteem.

It isn't that our Lord treats children differently than he treats anyone else, but what is significant is the He treats them as special as everyone else. They are no less important and deserving of His love and attention merely because they are young. He esteems them as He esteems the poor, or the Samaritan woman, or the tax collector, or the common

fisherman. And it is this value He placed upon their worth that we have lost sight of today in many ways. It is easy for the children to become a burden and source of stress rather than a source of blessing. When they are hurting and we tell them to "grow up or stop that crying or we'll give them something to cry about", we are crushing the very spirit that God gave them which makes them special.

One gift that Jesus gave everyone, including the children, was that no one's pain is unimportant. Jesus takes time to stop what He is doing and cares for our pains. Likewise we are to do the same for all others. Even if we have pains of our own.

Flag desecration not speech

The June 21 editorial "Free speech encroachment should raise a red flag" did indeed raise a red flag -- not against the flag protection amendment but rather the myths that were presented as facts.

First, desecrating the U.S. flag is not speech. Baseball legend Tommy Lasorda said it best: "Speech is when you talk." It is a physical, hateful act that was outlawed by tradition since the birth of our nation and for more than 100 years of law in 48 states until one misguided decision by the Supreme Court overruled five previous courts in making hateful conduct something to be protected as "speech."

Chief Justice William Rehnquist, dissenting in Texas vs. Johnson in 1989, noted disdain for repugnant conduct by writing, "surely, one of the high purposes of a democratic society is to legislate against conduct that is regarded as evil and profoundly offensive to the majority of people, whether it be murder, embezzlement, pollution or flag burning." It is this point that the majority on that court and a tiny minority in this

country fail to understand or refuse to accept.

As Congress once again prepares to vote on returning the right of the people to protect their flag, I ask them to consider that James Madison, who wrote the First Amendment, condemned flag burning as a crime. Thomas Jefferson agreed with Madison and made clear in his writing that "speech" in the First Amendment meant the spoken word, not expressive conduct. That's why our founding fathers deliberately left out the words "expression" and "expressive conduct" from the Bill of Rights.

On behalf of the 2.7 million military veterans of the American Legion, I urge members of Congress to heed the voices of the people of Illinois and all 50 state legislatures. Pass the flag protection amendment and let the people decide, through ratification, if their flag is worthy of protection.
