'The Greatest Generation: Vietnam Veterans'

fter serving in Iraq, U.S. Army Staff Sgt. David
Bellavia was walking through the Atlanta airport
wearing his protective combat uniform when he
was approached by two crying men - Vietnam veterans.
They said to Bellavia, "Welcome home." And then they
said three words that Bellavia "never expected to hear
from another veteran. They said, 'I love you."

Bellavia is the recipient of the Silver Star for his actions during the Second Battle of Fallujah, as well as the recipient of the Bronze Star, three Army Commendation Medals, two Army Achievement Medals and the New York State Conspicuous Cross He is the vice chairman of Veis. foL. Freedom and he published a memoir in 2007, "House to House: An Epic Memoir of War."

Bellavia shared with attendees at the Legion's national convention why he believes Vietnam War veterans are the greatest generation.

"I think the greatest generation is an I8-year-old kid, who can't even spell the country he was drafted to serve in," Bellavia said. "The greatest generation would turn on the radio and be told that they were baby killers by popular culture. They were told by Hollywood that they were ignorant and a fool for doing what their country asked of them.


The greatest generation was a generation that stood shoulder to shoulder and protected Iraq and Afghanistan veterans from the same unwashed ignorant classes that choose to put the soldier behind the foreign policy.

The greatest generation is a generation of veterans who were treated with dishonor and shame and made sure that their sons and daughters would never be treated like they were treated."

To all Vietnam veterans, Bellavia says, "Welcome home. We love you."

Medal Of Honor

Washington -- The Army and the nation are mourning the passing of World War II veteran and Medal of Honor recipient Nicholas Oresko, who died Oct. 4. He was 96 years old.

Oresko, who was a master sergeant, had been the oldest living Medal of Honor recipient at the time of his passing. He received the nation's highest military decoration Oct. 12, 1945.

Sgt. Maj. of the Army Raymond F. Chandler III said the nation has lost a hero.

"I join the family and friends of former Master Sgt. Nicholas Oresko who grieve at the loss of our nation's oldest recipient of the Medal of Honor," he said.

Chandler praised the bravery of Oresko.

"As his (Medal of Honor) citation states, 'his quick thinking, indomitable courage, and unswerving devotion' on Jan. 23, 1945, saved the lives of many of his fellow Soldiers and allowed his unit to accomplish its mission," said Chandler.

"Thank you, Nicholas, for your lesson in personal courage and selfless service," said Chandler.

Oresko, who had received an outpouring of love and support from the community, was surrounded by veterans and current military members in his final days. Some service members reportedly stood watch at his bedside after Oresko was admitted to a New Jersey hospital where he died due to complications from surgery.

His wife passed away in 1980 and his son died in 2010. He will be buried in New Jersey with full military honors.

Oresko is a hero in his hometown, Bayonne, N.J., where a school is named after him, according to the mayor's office.

opportunity to do was to name a school after Nicholas Oresko while he was still with us. May his courage continue to inspire all of us," said Bayonne Mayor Mark A. Smith.

Oresko made his hometown proud and represented the patriotism of the community so well, said Smith.

"Nicholas Oresko showed uncommon bravery, carrying out two one-man attacks on German bunkers," he said. "Although he was wounded, he refused to leave the battlefield until his mission was accomplished."

His outstanding heroism and courage helped defeat Nazi Germany, and his actions will stand as a great example for future generations, said Smith.

In the Battle of the Bulge, Oresko "swiftly worked ahead alone" after "deadly automatic fire from the flanks pinned down his unit" near Tettingen, Germany, Jan. 23, 1945, according to his Medal of Honor citation.

Oresko, a platoon sergeant with Company C, 302nd Infantry Regiment, 94th Infantry Division, 3rd Army, moved through the gunfire and then threw a grenade into a German position, rushed the bunker and killed all the hostile occupants who survived the grenade blast, it said.

He then, according to the citation, continued the assault after he was wounded in machinegun fire.

"As withering machinegun and rifle fire swept the area, he struck out alone in advance of his men to a second bunker," the citation states.

"With a grenade, he crippled the dug-in machinegun defending this position and then wiped out the troops manning it with his rifle, completing his second self-imposed, one-man attack."

Oresko, with "quick thinking, indomitable courage, and unswerving devotion to the attack in the face of bitter resistance and while wounded," killed 12

Germans, prevented a delay in the assault, and made it possible for Company C to obtain its objective with minimum casualties, according to the citation.

Oresko received the Medal of Honor in a White House ceremony with 14 other members of the armed forces, according to the Harry S. Truman Library and Museum.

"It is the greatest honor that can come to a man. It is an honor that all of us strive for, but very few of us ever achieve," said President Harry S. Truman in bestowing the award, states the transcript from the presidential library and museum.

Junior Achievement

He youngest combatant in the U.S. armed forces during World War II (and probably the youngest since the Spanish-American War, if not the Civil War) was Calvin Grahm (1930-1992) of Forth Worth, Texas. Early in 1942 the twelve-year-old Grahm lied about his age and enlisted in the Navy. He served in the battleship South Dakota during the Guadalcanal campaign. In one of the battles, he was wounded and his true age discovered. When the ship returned to the United States for repairs, Grahm was given a one-way pass to his original recruiting station, which didn't know what to do with him. Meanwhile, since he did not return to his ship, he was classed as a deserter, arrested, and jailed . Released after he finally managed to convince the navy that he was only thirtee, Grahm was promptly given a dishonorable discharge and denied disability benefits because he had enlisted under false premises. Grahm, who later reenlisted for a time after attaining the proper age was eventually the beneficiary of special legislation to restore pay and benefits lost upon his original discharge. Grahm was one of several hundred boys under seventeen who are believed to have enlisted in the U.S. armed

forces using forged birth certificates and similar documents.

By a curious coincidence, Grahm's division officer while he was aboard the *South Dakota* was *Sargent Shriver*, who was later President John F. Kennedy's brother-in-law, and one of the ship's steersmen was a future teacher of one of the authors (A. A. Nofi) of this volume ('Dirty Little Secrets of World War II').

Winter Flannels

The first flannel underwear was used in Boston, Mass., by Lord Percy's regiment when they were encamped on the Common in October 1774. There was barely enough flannel cloth in the town to cover that one regiment. Eventually, flannels came to be almost synonymous with long underwear, thanks to the severity of New England winters. Union Suits followed shortly, being the same idea in a united shirt and pants. These days, flannel is mor often seen around town as a plaid or striped shirt, and flannel sheets provide extra warmth when the temperature drops.
